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Your kind manner in Expressing my^d Charlemonts orders Intitles me
to a sense of acknowledged Gratitude, I have from these
Orders of D^r Charlemonts to whom I owe all Possible Thanks
of Kindness, Duty, and the greatest Respect; reflected on, and
amounts in some measure to these.

First - I having form'd from my own Judgement and variety of Inquiries
when in England for his D^r ships Acc^d - Two Reasons past to form
wells agreeable to his D^r ships sentiments made known to me,
and the manner most proper for the Training & advantage
of the voice Trees, not known here, and but by very few in
England, must be distressfull to me, to think that such Trees
should be abandon'd to Destruction, & such walls after the
great Expence his D^r ship has been at, furnish'd with Ignorant
management -

Secondly. The best stone yet ever was constructed, when in Pleasing varieties
as well as usefulness is Intended and advancing to, should
also be put into the hands of Ignorance, is to me also very
Distressfull.

Lastly. out of the strongest sense of Duty & Gratitude & to discharge
a Duty so incumbent on me to so good & worthy a Nobleman as
D^r Charlemont, I do request to prevent the misfortunes that must

certainly attend the fruits & store, and thereby his Ships High
intentions frustrated, ^{to} beg leave of my Lord Charlemont to accept
of my Superintendance, that I may have the Honour to give his
Ship some satisfaction on his Ships happy return, which I
offer to his Ship without any gratuity. If these sentiments which is
designed from a mind full of candour & Esteem for Lord Charlemont should
have the happy Effect, it will give me the greatest satisfaction, on the
other hand if it is not acceptable, I shall have the comfort to satisfy
my self with ^t I have discharged my Duty.
